Narrative Budget Explains Spending Plan for FY 2025

Currituck County staff prepared an easy-to-read narrative budget that explains the county government's financial plan for Fiscal Year 2025. The Currituck County Operating Budget and Capital Improvement Plan is available for viewing on the county website.

The narrative budget format is easy to follow and provides insight to the various funds that comprise the county budget. It also gives information on policies and procedures that guide the budgeting process for staff and the Board of Commissioners.

Readers can find information on each department within county government and view information on recent accomplishments and future plans. Each department section includes a financial chart that compares current spending with previous fiscal years. Revenues and expenditures are clearly explained, so citizens can see where their tax dollars are going. Approximately 37% of the county's operating budget will fund public safety and approximately 20% will be spent on education. Citizens can also learn about current and future capital improvement projects planned throughout the county.


Traditional line-item financial charts for all funds are also included in the document's appendix.

Currituck County's Risk Management Administrator recently earned a professional development certification from the state of North Carolina. Victor Lasher is now certified as a Public Sector Manager of Environmental, Safety and Health. This designation is granted by NC State University, the Safety and Health Council of North Carolina, and the NC Department of Labor.

Risk Management As Administrator, Lasher develops and implements many safety protocols and standards to keep Currituck County employees safe on the job. He works closely with state agencies to provide safety inspections and address worker compensation claims and accident reports to



prevent financial penalties for the county. He also partners with county departments, such as Fire-Emergency Medical Services, in promoting safe practices to prevent employees from being exposed to infectious diseases.

Citizens Academy Enjoys Successful Third Year

In April, Currituck County concluded the third cohort of its Citizens Academy. This popular program offers 12 weekly classes for citizens to learn about services and operations from many county departments. During the 2024 Citizens Academy, a class of approximately 30 county residents met with a total of 21 departments, the County Manager, and Clerk to the Board of Commissioners

The Citizens Academy visited several county facilities to allow class participants an inside look at offices and equipment. Sites visited included the Public Safety Center, Historic Courthouse, Mainland Water Plant, Detention Center, Cooperative Extension, Animal Shelter, Currituck Senior Center, and Judicial Center. During each department presentation, heads and staff explained their responsibilities, provided tours, displayed equipment, and answered many questions.

The 2025 Citizens Academy will be held from February to April. Look for registration to this free program to begin around the first of December.

Social Services Staff Steps Out for Child Abuse Prevention

Statistics Show Deputies Vigilant in Keeping Community Safe

Currituck County is well-served by an active and dedicated Sheriff's Office that works 24/7 to protect citizens in our community. In the four-month period of January 1 to May 1, the Sheriff's Office received 22,820 calls.

Water Plant Expansion **Increases Treatment Capacity**

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On May 8, the Water Department had a successful start-up of the third reverse osmosis water treatment train at the Mainland Water Treatment Plant. This addition can produce 750,000 gallons per day of treated water.

Combined with a new well additional supplying raw water to the Mainland Water Treatment Plant, Currituck can provide a reliable 2.25 million gallons per day of potable water to Mainland water customers. Thanks to the many Currituck County employees who helped make this project successful!

Currituck County completed a similar expansion at the Southern Outer Banks Water System. The treatment plant there was also expanded by an additional 750,000 gallons per day. These two projects are part of the county's commitment to improving infrastructure and planning for continued growth in the future.

Currituck Schools Work Closely with County Gov on Incident Training

Officials from Currituck County Schools and county government public safety departments have held multiple sessions this spring to review and enhance safety plans related to a serious incident occuring at a county school.

For years, the schools have worked with the Sheriff's Office. **Fire-Emergency** Medical Services, Emergency 911 Management, and Communications to plan and train for an active shooter or other type of critical incident. Each school has a set of documented plans to help guide staff throughout such an incident and coordinate with the emergency responders.


A primary focus of this year's training is the post-incident reunification process that would occur to reunite parents with their children. As one can imagine, this would be a complex procedure, with many factors to consider.

Currituck personnel have been working closely with experts from On Target Preparedness, a firm that specializes in emergency planning for critical incidents. On Target led staff through scenarios that involved the need for a mass emergency response and reunification at an off-campus location.

Discussion topics included specific roles and responsibilities of school staff, notifying parents and the public, deciding upon a reunification site, and safety and protocols at the reunification site. These types of tabletop exercises help staff identify specific needs and develop action plans.

While everyone certainly hopes these emergency plans are never needed, the school system and county government are working in tandem to be prepared.

U.S. Fish & Wildlife Investing in Mackay Island NWR and Currituck NWR

Two National Wildlife Refuges (NWR) in Currituck County have been selected as participants in a federal initiative to protect and restore coastal ecosystems. The Department of the Interior will disburse funding included in the Inflation Reduction Act to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, to be used for projects that promote coastal resiliency and climate adaptation.

Projects identified include two within Currituck County.

At Mackay Island NWR, a living shoreline construction will reduce wave action, trap sediment, and protect high priority sites for wildlife. It will also help protect valuable marsh and wetland habitats to improve water quality and lessen severity of storm surge flooding.

Mackay Island includes nearly 10,000 acres, most of which is located on Knotts Island. The refuge has recorded 187 species of birds, including the King Rail

(photo), and is also home to a variety of reptiles, amphibians and mammals.

At the Currituck NWR in Corolla, a living shoreline construction will stabilize and slow the loss of marsh habitat on Monkey Island, as well as reducing wave action and trapping sediment.



Hot Weather Safety Tips

Summertime in northeastern North Carolina can include many hot, sweltering days through a combination of high temperatures and humidity. All county residents should be aware of the stress that extreme heat puts upon your bodies while exercising or working outdoor in extreme heat. Older adults, children, and sick or overweight individuals are at the greatest risk of heat-related illnesses.



What to Do

- Take frequent breaks when exercising or working outdoors.
- Stop physical activity and move to a cooler place.
- Loosen clothes and put wet cloths on your head and body.
- Get medical help right way if a person passes out or has other symptoms lasting longer than one hour.

Things to Remember During Extreme Heat

- Avoid strenous outdoor activities.
- Wear loose, lightweight clothing.
- Use sunscreen and wear a wide hat to protect your face.
- Drink plenty of fluids.
- Never leave people or pets in a closed car. Animals can die of heatstroke within 15 minutes.
- Watch for warning signs such as cramps, elevated heart rate, and dizziness.
- Try to keep your home cool and know where you can go to get cooler or be in air conditioning.
- Check on family, friends, and neighbors.
