

NOTICE TO BIDDERS

The County of Currituck, North Carolina ("the Owner") requests bids for the replacement of the Corolla Horse Fence located on the oceanfront near the 4x4 beach driving ramp at the end of paved NC Highway 12 in Corolla, North Carolina. The scope of work consists of replacing approximately 345 feet of piling and cable fencing from the vehicle drive through gate on the beach to the last piling in the ocean.

Bids will be received by email to Rebecca Gay, Contract Purchasing Agent at rebecca.gay@currituckcountync.gov until 2:00 p.m. Eastern Standard Time (EST) on Friday, February 12, 2021. Bids received after this deadline will not be accepted. It is the sole responsibility of the Bidder to ensure receipt of its' bid by the County. A non-mandatory Pre-Bid Meeting will be held on February 1, 2021 at 1:00 p.m. at the site. Face coverings are required.

All questions requiring additional information will be responded to in an addendum no later than 4:00 p.m. on February 8, 2021. All addenda shall become part of the Contract Documents.

This is an informal bid. Bids will not be opened publicly and read aloud. Award will be made to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. No bid may be withdrawn after the scheduled closing time for the receipt of bids for a period of 30 days.

All bidders must meet the licensing requirements under Chapter 87 of the N.C. General Statutes. Small Business Entities, Women Owned Businesses and Minority Owned Businesses are encouraged to submit bids.

The County reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to waive informalities and defects, as it may deem to be in its best interest.
