Exciting Developments Coming to Currituck Regional Airport Include ECSU Flight School

Many residents may not be aware that Currituck County is home to a thriving - and growing - airport. Though no commercial flights are available at the facility, Currituck Regional Airport receives a significant amount of private air traffic every year.

Currituck's is one of 62 publicly owned airports in North Carolina. The airport features a 5,500 foot runway and averages more than 30,000 takeoffs and landings each year.

The airport is a state and federally supported facility. In 2024, Currituck received a \$4 million grant from the Transportation Reserve Directed Fund that is

being used to construct a new set of hangars that will house 10 aircraft. In addition, more space will be cleared and prepared for additional hangars. This growth is vital, as the customer waiting list for hangar space includes more than 70 aircraft.

Another exciting project is Currituck County's partnership with Elizabeth City State University, which is expanding its popular Aviation Sciences program. The county conveyed land to ECSU, which will use state grant funding to construct a classroom facility and hangar with access to the airport's taxiway. ECSU plans to house a number of its airplanes full-time

in Currituck County. A March groundbreaking ceremony signals the start of construction for the "Currituck Flight School".

The flight school will create more educational and career pathways for county residents, alongside programs offered in Currituck County by the College of the Albemarle. Look for updates as this project progresses!



Looking Ahead: Board of Commissioners Developing Strategic Plan to Guide Future Progress

The Currituck County Board of Commissioners took its first steps towards developing a Strategic Plan during its retreat in early February at the Public Safety Center.

Forming a Strategic Plan is a key initiative of the Board of Commissioners and the process will lead the Board to a shared vision that guides decision-making, aligns resources with priorities, and provides direction for short and long-term work plans.

As an initial step, Commissioners developed three important components of the Strategic Plan during its retreat. The Board crafted a mission statement, wrote a vision statement, and

identified four core values to guide decision making. These items were officially adopted by the Board of Commissioners during its February 17, 2025, meeting.

Future steps in the strategic planning process will include identifying long-term goals and short-term action strategies. The public will be engaged through online information and town hall meetings to be scheduled at various locations throughout Currituck County.

Cost Sharing Program Aims to Lower Feral Cat Numbers

Currituck County Animal Services encourages citizens who care for feral cats to join the Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program. The TNR program is a cost-sharing initiative that eventually lowers the county's feral cat population through spaying and neutering.

The Board of Commissioners appropriated \$20,000 to fund the TNR program and address concerns brought forth by citizens.

"Starting a TNR program is a vital way to protect the health and safety of our wildlife populations. Feral cats need veterinary care, human supervision, and oversight to prevent long-term issues and explosive growth. The program also provides an opportunity

for the county to partner with nonprofits and veterinarians to provide these services at a fraction of the cost," said Selina Jarvis, Currituck County Commissioner.

To participate in the TNR program, citizens who provide food, water, and/or shelter for feral cats must register with Animal Services as a feral cat caregiver. Caregivers collect feral cats in humane traps provided by Animal Services for transport to a local veterinarian. After the cats are spayed or neutered, caregivers return the cats to the location where they were originally trapped.

Currituck County is partnering with Eastern Shore Animal Hospital in Grandy to provide spaying/neutering services,

rabies vaccines, vaccinations for Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, and Panleukopenia, ear-tipping, and post-operative pain medications. Each package of feral cat veterinary care costs \$125. Currituck County will contribute \$100 and citizens will pay \$25.


GIS Online Map Features New Imagery

The Geographic Information Services (GIS) staff recently upgraded the interactive online map with new aerial photographs. The map, available for public use, now includes high-resolution images taken in 2024 by the North Carolina Orthoimagery Program.

The Interactive Online Map is a free tool that provides a wealth of information. Users can search for a property by address, owner's name, street name, global PIN, and Parcel ID number. Property information includes acreage, tax land value,

tax building value, property boundaries, owners, and last sale date. Both overhead and street-view images are available.

Typical Items Collected

Aerosols, antifreeze, household batteries, fire extinguishers, propane tanks, alkaline and acidic cleaners, pool chemicals, fertilizers, weed & feed, pesticides, insecticides, fungicides, fluorescent light tubes, mercury, oil-based paints, paint thinners, wood filler, adhesives, caulk.

Property Tax Relief Deadline: June 1

Tax relief is available for lower income homeowners in Currituck County who are at least 65 years old or are permanently disabled. Up to 50% of a property's assessed value can be exempted.

To qualify, the homeowner must meet all of the following:

- Is a Currituck County resident; and,
- Has a 100% service-connected disability; and,
- Separation of military service was honorable or under honorable conditions; and,
- Obtains a Disabled Veteran certification from a NC State or Local Veteran's Service Center. (Form NCDVA-9).

Tax relief is also available for disabled veteran homeowners and surviving spouses who have a total and permanent service-connected disability. Up to \$45,000 of the property's assessed value is exempted. To

qualify, the homeowner must meet all the following:

Operation Santa Provides Holiday Joy for Hundreds

Thank you to everyone in the community who participated in the 2024 Operation Santa Claus! Directed by the Department of Social Services, Operation Santa utilized a generous amount of donations to provide holiday assistance to hundreds of Currituck County residents.

For the 2024 Christmas holiday, Operation Santa provided presents for 616 local children. Operation Santa also provided food baskets for 52 senior citizens in the county.

This incredible success was made possible through public donations. In 2024, Operation Santa received \$16,685.43 in donations from individuals, businesses, and community groups. Donations also provided

\$8,325 in gift cards that were used to buy groceries for the senior citizens' food baskets.

In addition, Currituck County employees generated \$1,705 for Operation Santa through a "blue jeans on Fridays" fundraiser. Employees could choose to donate \$2 each week in exchange for permission to wear blue jeans to work on Friday. This fundraiser began in the fall and continued each week through December.

Sheriff's Office Responded to 67,000+ Calls in 2024

The Currituck County Sheriff's Office was very busy keeping our community safe in 2024. During the year, deputies responded to 67,302 calls for law enforcement services throughout the county.

The reason for the highest number of calls was traffic stops. In 2024, deputies made 10,447 traffic stops. The category for the second-highest amount of calls was citations and ordinance violations, with 8,910.

In relation to traffic stops, the Sheriff's Office recorded 172 DWI stops. Deputies also responded to 537 wrecks during the year.

Additional calls for law enforcement included:

- 797 warrants/arrests
- 520 fraud/larceny
- 389 domestic/fight calls
- 131 drug charges
- 14 high risk calls
- 13 water rescues

Currituck County is very fortunate to have a professional and highly-trained Sheriff's Office, under the direction of Sheriff Matt Beickert. The department's leadership also includes Chief Deputy Jeff Walker, Captain Neel Smith, Captain Kevin McCord, Lieutenant Garland Akers, Lieutenant Swany Dudley, and Lieutenant Jesse Taylor.

Southern Outer Banks Water System Brings Additional Capacity Online

Currituck County successfully completed an expansion of the Southern Outer Banks Water System's reverse-osmosis treatment plant. This project increases capacity and helps to ensure the availability of treated water for customers in Corolla.

An additional section was added to the reverse-osmosis treatment apparatus, bringing forth an increase in capacity of 750,000

gallons per day. In addition, an emergency generator and automatic transfer switch were installed to provide working capability and reliable service during any power outages that may occur in Corolla.

Don't Get Hooked by Phishing! Seniors Must Be Aware of Scams

Senior citizens are a frequent target of online scams. In 2023, individuals aged 60 and older reported losses exceeding \$3.4 billion due to scams, an 11% increase from the previous year. The average loss per victim in this age group was approximately \$33,915.

"Phishing" is when a scammer tries to trick you into giving out your personal information, passwords, Social Security numbers or bank account details. They usually do this by sending a fake email or text message that looks like it's from a company or person you trust such as a bank, online store, or even a friend. The message might say there is a problem with your account or that you've won a prize and then ask you to click a link.

How to Spot Phishing

- Urgent language like "Act Now" or "Your account will be locked".
- Suspicious links or attachments.
- Unexpected requests for personal information.

- Poor grammar and spelling.

What You Should Do

- Don't open any suspicious links or attachments.
- If you do, close the window or application that opened immediately.
- Run a virus scan.
- Change your passwords immediately.

Examples of Computer Scams

- Unsolicited calls or pop-ups claiming problems.
- Urgent warnings about a computer virus.
- Requests for remote access.
- Claims to be "certified Microsoft technicians".

What to Do

- Power off the device.
- Run a virus scan when the device turns back on.

Worse Case Scenarios

- Contact affected companies immediately, such as banks.
- Monitor financial statements and report suspicious activity.
- Alert credit bureaus.
- Consider professional help.



Community Readiness Tip: Spring Clean Your Safety Kits

An emergency safety kit is one of those things that gets tucked away and forgotten about. But it's important to ensure that everything inside it is up to date and ready to go. It's time to spring clean your safety kit!

Review Your Kit's Contents

Know what you have. It should include water, non-perishable food, first aid supplies, flashlights, radio, multi-tool, clothes, blankets, medications, important documents, and cash.

Check All Items

Examine expiration dates on food and medicine. Replace as needed and ensure that first aid supplies are usable.

Test and Replace Batteries

Make sure flashlights and radios are functional. Test all batteries and replace as needed.

Update Personal Information and Documents

Check important documents and contact information.

Refill Medications & Special Needs Items

Fill prescriptions, special medical needs, and allergy lists.

Evaluate your kit's storage location and make sure everyone knows where it is located. This should be part of your overall family emergency plan. Good communication is important to being ready!
